

Part 4: Love is the Greatest Pastor Dave Browning May 28 & 29, 2011

1 Corinthians 13:13

And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love.

If you want to positively affect your relationships - try love.

Love is greater than:

Giftedness

If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. -1 Corinthians 13:1

Insight

If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. — 1 Corinthians 13:2

<u>Accomplishments</u>

If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing. — 1 Corinthians 13:3

Love is "what seeks the <u>best</u> for its <u>object</u>."

Christ's love says, "You matter to me, no matter what.".

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud."

— 1 Corinthians 13:4,5

No matter where you are (in relationship to me)

- Behind me; Love is patient, kind
- <u>Above</u> me; Does not envy
- <u>Below</u> me; Does not boast, is not proud

No matter how difficult you make it (to love you)

Love is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. -1 Corinthians 13:5-6

To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything, and your heart will certainly be wrung and possibly be broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact, you must give your heart to no one, not even to an animal. Wrap it carefully with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements; lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket – safe, dark, motionless, airless – it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable, impenetrable, irredeemable. The alternative to tragedy, or at least to the risk of tragedy, is damnation. The only place outside heaven where you will be perfectly safe from all the dangers of love is hell. – C.S. Lewis

No matter how long I have to hang in there (with you)

It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails.

— 1 Corinthians 13:7-8

Becoming a better disciple of Christ means becoming a better lover

- 1. Loving more people than you've ever loved before
- 2. Growing in the kinds of people you love
- 3. Loving over <u>longer</u> periods of time Love is patient...not easily angered...always perseveres (1 Corinthians 13:4-7)
- 4. Loving in more ways that you've loved before

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. — 1 Corinthians 13:4-5

The measure of a life is love.
